Rural Worship Workshop

Rural Worship - such a richness of ways we have to worship God in the midst of his creation and people.

Whilst Sunday by Sunday we sometimes struggle in our rural churches - especially in the colder months - we have so many glorious opportunities in rural, farming and village life to connect with people and offer praise and thanksgiving to God.

First there is the seasonality of the farming year. All around us we can see the evidence of sowing, growing, harvesting and animal husbandry - the lambs appearing in the fields in spring and the cows daily queuing up to be milked. We can see with our own eyes what a what a hot and dry summer or a wet and frozen winter can do to the land, and farming forms the basis of so much of our rural life. So we have opportunities to join with our farmers, as we celebrate the harvest, or pray for the year ahead, and particularly in these uncertain times to show how much we appreciate their work and production of our food and care for our landscape - all so inter-twined.

Then there are our traditional Christian festivals throughout the year - what does a rural Holy Week and Easter look like? Or Ascension Day on the top of a hill? Nativities in cow sheds are becoming more popular, and Mothering Sunday with glorious spring flowers of Devon primroses and daffodils are a delight.

There is also more and more research that concludes that being outside and connecting with nature is really good for our mental and physical well-being - well we probably know that instinctively I think - and as churches we have the opportunity to add "Spiritual well-being" to this list with our beautiful coast and countryside around us wherever we look. We can engage in prayer walks, beach events, pilgrimages or picnics - perhaps tying our events in with specially

designated days such as World Environment Day,
National Friendship Day or 30 days wild with the Devon
Wildlife Trust - and bring an extra dimension of prayer
and worship to the whole - as well as connecting with
people who might not normally connect their care for
nature with the love of God. There are also lots of
ideas around at the moment about forest or wild
church worship opportunities - all of which help to
connect us with our creator God. And of course - there
are all sorts of resources being developed for
Creationtide itself.

We have opportunities to bless our communities in celebration and sadness - perhaps the beginning of the new cricket season or the restoration of a village hall are celebrated and blessed, a person remembered in a special place, the loss of a school or pub marked with a celebration of its life and what it has meant to the village.

All these - and thoughts for how "Festival Churches" can add to our missional worship - are just some of the opportunities we have to make Rural Worship really special - no doubt you have lots more examples - which would be great to hear about!

So - to bring some of these ideas together - and develop some new ones - in conjunction with the Exeter Diocesan Worship, Prayer and Spirituality Group, the Growing the Rural Church Project and the Farming Community Network, on Saturday October 12th, 9.30 am to 1 pm, at Teign Valley Community Hall in Christow, the Devon Churches Rural Forum is hosting a Rural Worship Workshop entitled "A Year of Rural Worship: God in Farm, Field and Village" and we would love to see you there!

Farm Visits Programme

We've had two super Farm Visits this year, to Dairyfield Farm near Crediton and Dartington Hall Farm near Totnes, and you can find reports of both visits and lots more photos on our website here.


These visits are for anyone in our churches who would like to learn first hand a bit more about the different aspects of farming and how our food is produced so we can understand the issues behind the headlines and support our farming community as much as we can.

Next year (in March - date to be confirmed) we are going to be visiting the Arla factory in North Tawton where we'll see how the milk from Dairyfield farm, amongst others, is processed after leaving the farm, and then Rhude Farm near Holsworthy on August 5th when our visit will coincide with the birth of the calves and we can see the "nursery" side of dairy farming. Farming Updates

One of the main themes, unsurprisingly, is the uncertainty and concerns surrounding Brexit.

Different sectors of farming will be affected in different ways, but, especially for our sheep farmers who export much of their lamb to Europe, an immediate imposition of tariffs could be very difficult indeed. Otherwise, silage crops have been doing very well, the milk price has been holding steady, and the harvest generally has begun well though the rain this week will be welcome for grass and crop growth. Support for Rural Women

Rural women can be particularly in need of support as a result of isolation, concern about the business and the challenges of looking after family, farm and maybe having an off-farm job as well. Through the DCRF, the Farming Community Network, the Women's Institute and the Mothers' Union jointly developed an open letter to rural women offering support and contacts which has been made available at recent events.

If you know anyone in the farming community who is struggling and may benefit from someone in the FCN coming alongside to listen and support – please signpost them to the FCN Website which has details of both e and phone help lines. To find a Mothers' Union branch near you phone 01392 254126 - one of the Exeter Diocese MU aims is to help support those living in rural isolation in our communities. DCRF Meetings

Since the last newsletter the Forum has met twice - in February and July. In February the main items we talked about were the Devon Communities Together Community Unity Project, some Growing the Rural Church Case Studies, the possibility of organising some rural placements for ordinands, support for rural women and more. You can download the notes for links and resources from this meeting here.

In July we were joined for part of the meeting by our Chief Constable of Devon and Cornwall Police, Shaun Sawyer, and some of his staff, as we discussed briefly some aspects of rural crime, the nature of the police's work in rural areas supporting people and how we can work together, especially in support of those who may be lonely or isolated. Professor Michael Winter presented his report on Changing Food Cultures and some challenges and opportunities for UK agriculture. We were also joined by Rev'd Dr Mark Betson who is the National Rural Officer for the Church of England. Mark explained his role in terms of both supporting the rural church on the ground and advising the national church on matters relating to rural life and church followed by a very interesting Q and A session where we discussed aspects of rural church life, including the missional use of our buildings. Our next meeting will be on October 16th at the Devon Young Farmers Centre in Cheriton Bishop, where our main theme will be to follow up on conversations with the Chief Constable in July on issues of rural crime and modern slavery and we will be joined by a number of people who will help our understanding of these issues so we can see how our churches can respond.
